LORD OF THE FLIES List of Characters

Ralph

Ralph is one of the older boys on the idland and remains the leader through most of th action. Focus remains fairly steadily on Ralph as we follow his psychological and actual physical struggle to establish some kind of rational order on the Island.

Jack

Jack is Ralph's most powerful antagonist who develops from the leader of the choirboys in the first chapter to chief of the savage hunters by the last. He is largely responsible for the heinous crimes perpetrated by some of the boys on their fellows.

Piggy.

Piggy is the intellectual in the group. He is physically weak and is given to complaining a good deal, but often perceives where the others cannot, the inherent benefits or dangers in a situation. Because of his appearance and manner, however, he is usually ignored. As the novel develops he becomes close friends with Ralph as the two are exiled by the savages. Piggy is finally killed by a large boulder released by Roger.

5imon

Simon is a unique character in the novel. He remains largely uninvolved with any of the power struggles between Ralph and Jack. He merely does his work and remains a friend to the weaker "littluns". It is Simon, however, who has a saint-like vision of the world, and who comes to understand the truth about the Lord of the Files and the beast on the mountain. When he tries to pass this knowledge on, he is mistaken for the beast himself and killed.

Roger

Roger is a kind of alter ego to Jack. He is constantly by his chief's side, and all he needs is the slightest excuse for him to doff all vestiges of civilized behavior and exert his sadistic will on weaker beings. He builtes the littluns and later kills Piggy.

Samneric (Sam and Eric)

The twins remain close to Ralph until the very end of the novel. As long as they follow Ralph instead of Jack we have some hope that all reason is not lost. But eventually they are forces into submission and they reveal Ralph's hiding place to the hunters.

The Littluns

"Littiuns" is the generic name for the youngest boys on the Island, none of whom really have distict personalities of their own. Because they are largely helpless we can judge the major characters by their efforts or lack thereof to help the littiuns along.
